| French | pneu Pneumatique | “pneu,” the shortened form used most often for “tire,” comes from the Latin “pneumaticus,” both of which refer to breathing air. First listed in a dictionary as a reference to tire in 1893. |
| German | Reifen Pneu Bereifung | “Reifen” and its derivative “Bereifung” trace their origins to the Latin word “reipus,” which is also the root of the English word “rope.” Reifen also means “hoop.” Pneu borrowed from the English/French; first noted in dictionary usage in 1910. |
